COMMUNITY-BASED CHILD AND YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH

Kinark's team of experts provide a range of evidence-based services from early intervention and parenting programs, to residential day treatment and intensive in-home programs. Community-based child and youth mental health (CYMH) services are provided in collaboration with child welfare agencies, schools and school boards, hospitals, and other child and youth mental health agencies and community partners.

AUTISM

As one of the nine Lead Agencies for Autism in Ontario, Kinark supports children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and their families throughout the Central and East regions of Ontario. Kinark delivers Intensive Behavioural Intervention (IBI) including increased supports for parents, caregivers, the school system and other service partners. Through the Connections for Students Program, the School Support Program (SSP) provides transition support to children leaving IBI and integrating into the educational system.

KINARK OUTDOOR CENTRE

Kinark operates the Kinark Outdoor Centre (KOC) in Minden, Ontario. The KOC offers therapeutic recreation and enhanced autism respite programs, including skill development, family enrichment and social recreation in a safe, well-supported and natural environment.

FORENSIC MENTAL HEALTH/YOUTH JUSTICE

Syl Apps Youth Centre (SAYC) is a secure mental health facility in Oakville that can provide support for up to 48 youth (male and female) mandated by the courts, including:

- · Secure treatment (by the Child & Family Services Act—CFSA)
- Secure detention and custody (by the Youth Criminal Justice Act—YCJA)
- · By order of the Ontario Review Board (only facility in Ontario designated for youth)

In addition, Kinark offers community-based forensic mental health/youth justice services.

• Intensive Support and Supervision Program (ISSP) is an alternative to custody for youth in conflict with the law with significant mental health issues who can be safely supported in the community. It provides youth with comprehensive assessment and treatment to address their behaviour and mental health issues, while assisting them to build their capacity to live productive lives.





OUR PROGRAMS









COMMUNITY-BASED CHILD & YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH

This year we:

Streamlined our services to be more efficient and targeted for clients and their families.

We continue to restructure our community CYMH services to make sure clients and
their families receive the services they need in a more timely way. One of the
things Kinark did was to introduce a common assessment tool to better identify
behavioural, social, and emotional needs early on to ensure clients receive the most
appropriate services. This means more specifically directed treatment and less time on
waitlists.

Published our first Policy Paper, entitled "Strengthening Children's Mental Health Residential Treatment through Evidence and Experience".

- This paper was developed by drawing on our extensive analysis of existing research evidence and our decades of experience as a residential treatment provider. The paper was shared with policy makers and Kinark's service partners. In this paper, Kinark calls on the government and service providers to commit to an improved system for children and youth with mental health issues that is rooted in strong capacity for individual assessments. - In October 2015, we co-hosted a community forum with Children's Mental Health Ontario and the Ontario Hospital Association to discuss ideas for shaping the transformation of residential treatment across the province with community partners and decision-makers.

Continued to work for better CYMH services for children, youth and their families.

- We completed our first year as Lead Agency in York, working collaboratively with community partners to complete Core Service Delivery and Community Mental Health Plans. Click here to learn more about the Ministry's Moving on Mental Health Strategy.
- We were appointed Lead Agency for CYMH by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services in both the Durham and Haliburton/ Kawartha Lakes/Peterborough service areas, to help coordinate better access to child & youth mental health services and supports that meet clients' needs.

This year we:

Further reduced wait time for Intensive Behavoural Intervention (IBI) service and the average age of children receiving service.

• Through on-going implementation of the recommendations from our Autism Services Review in 2012, we reduced the wait times for (IBI) by an average of 32 days. The average age of children receiving IBI service went from 7 years old to about 6 1/2 years old, allowing children to benefit from service earlier.

Improved our business processes so more time is devoted to the children we serve.

• To save time for parents, service providers and our staff, we introduced a one-time funding agreement with parents to replace the former contract that required review every 6 months.

Increased communication and collaboration with our community partners who provide service to clients receiving Direct Funding Option (DFO) services.

• Three research publications are currently under preparation by our clinicians.

This year we:

Welcomed nearly 4,000 people who participated in KOC programs.

• 61 children attended the Kinark Outdoor Centre Autism Summer Camp, many sleeping away from home for the first time – and for a few it is even the first time sleeping in a different room or bed than their parents. Thanks to the Kinark Foundation this number is up by 10 campers.

Increased the number of families who could participate.

 Over 250 children, siblings, and parents attended Ministry-funded autism respite programs and 122 families attended therapeutic, recreational, and other kinds of respite programs.

Provided Respite support to families on the Autism waitlist.

• 97 families attended autism family respite programs while waiting for clinical services to begin.

FORENSIC MENTAL HEALTH / YOUTH JUSTICE

This Year We:

Improved the Youth Advisory program to ensure our youth had a voice at Syl Apps Youth Centre.

• This program is designed to provide a two-way flow of communication between youth and staff. Youth from each unit are peer-nominated and convey information back to peers in their units, which then provides an opportunity for youth to voice any concerns to influence policy and program decisions.

Updated Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (DBT) training and intervention for staff.

• DBT is an evidence-based treatment and one of the best practice modalities for youth in forensic mental health/youth justice settings. This year Child and Youth Workers (CYWs) received updated training to support youth at SAYC to receive the most up-to-date and effective clinical intervention to meet their needs.

Co-hosted an annual school symposium with the Halton District School Board (HDSB) for knowledge exchange and networking with professionals who also work with complex youth.

- The Symposium offered an opportunity for professionals working with this population of at-risk and complex youth to share their experiences and best practices in helping these clients to succeed.
- Partners included: Halton Regional Police Department, probation officers, teachers from HDSB and other facilities, clinicians, Ministry Children and Youth Services, and the coroner.
